## Story of Woman Kidnapped by Apache Chief Nana Topic of June 1 EMHS Free Public Talk

EMHS will host a free public talk at 2 p.m. Saturday, June 1, as Bob Roland of the Cibola County Historical Society presents “The Ballad of Plácida Romero”.

The true story is that Plácida Romero’s husband and his ranching partner were killed by Nana during the Apache’s last raid into New Mexico in the summer of 1881. This occurred at their sheep ranch, approximately 30 miles southeast of Grants. Plácida was taken captive and subsequently taken all the way to an Apache rancheria in Mexico after many battles with pursuing Buffalo Soldiers. After almost two months, Placida escaped and eventually was repatriated with her family in Cubero, N.M.

The talk is scheduled for 2 p.m. in Tijeras. Please note that unlike previous EMHS talks, this will happen on a Saturday and is scheduled at the Senior Center, just west of the historic little church where we normally meet. Because the East Mountain Library will be open, we ask that those attending park their vehicles at the Senior Center and not at the library. The talk is free and open to the public. Refreshments will be served.

Aulton E. “Bob” Roland, the presenter, has spent most of his life in New Mexico after his family arrived in 1949 in Albuquerque. He now lives with his wife, Nelcine, in Grants.

This story from Cibola County was originally published in the *New Mexico Historical Review* in 2011 and a book length version is scheduled for publication in the Spring of 2020.

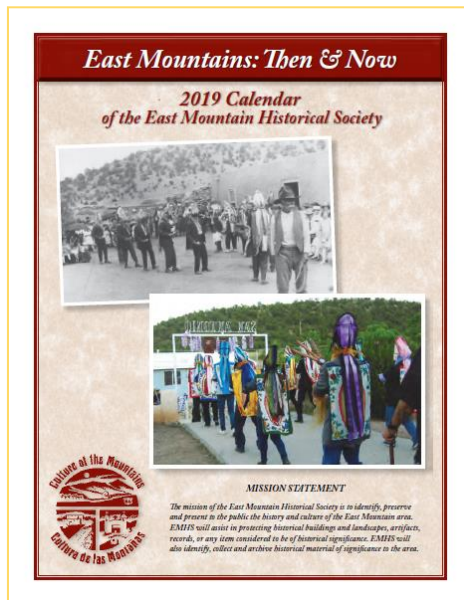
Our team – you – really came together at this conference. . . . Again, thanks for all your help.

## ***EMHS To Host Table at San Antonio Fiesta June 15***

In honor of the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Village of San Antonio, founded in 1819, special touches have been added to this year's San Antonio de Padua Mission Church fiesta, with the East Mountain Historical Society taking part. Most events will be held at the church, located one mile north of Tijeras on NM-14, with others at the main church in Tijeras and at the Cañón de Carnué Land Grant Hall on Route 66.

To make this fiesta special, *mayordoma* Roberta Chavez said she invited EMHS and other groups to participate in the Saturday (June 15) events, and a dance will be held at the Cañón de Carnué Land Grant Hall Saturday evening from 7 to 11, featuring live music (\$5 a person/\$9 a couple). The Rock Canyon Tap Room next door will be open.

On Saturday, EMHS will have an informational table with our binders of local families' oral histories and photographs at the San Antonio church. We also will be selling our maps – *Mapping Our Vanishing Past* -- and our 2019 calendar (see calendar cover at left), the latter of which pairs two photographs -- *matachines* dancing at the San Antonio fiestas in 1921 and 2017. Calendars will be sold at a special fiesta price.



Roberta said she is making T-shirts that feature a screen shot of San Antonio as it appeared in the classic movie *Grapes of Wrath*, which was filmed in the village when only a dirt road passed through. Other vendors lined up so far will be selling fudge and children's books.

The fiesta will start with vespers (prayers) Friday, June 14 at 7 p.m.; Saturday's events start with mass at 10 a.m.

After mass, the Matachines will dance behind the church to bless the Ojito, or spring, up the hill. From about 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., food will be served at the main Holy Child Church in Tijeras. Food will also be available at the San Antonio Church from vendors, including sale of fiesta burgers.

At 1 p.m. James West and his daughter will perform a native dance for about 15 minutes at the San Antonio church, followed by a musical *entrega* welcoming Roberta into another year of service as *mayordoma*, after which more dancing will commence.

Here is a schedule of the **other Holy Child Parish fiestas** for this year, with vespers at 7 p.m. on Fridays and mass at 10 a.m. on Saturdays. Visitors are welcome.

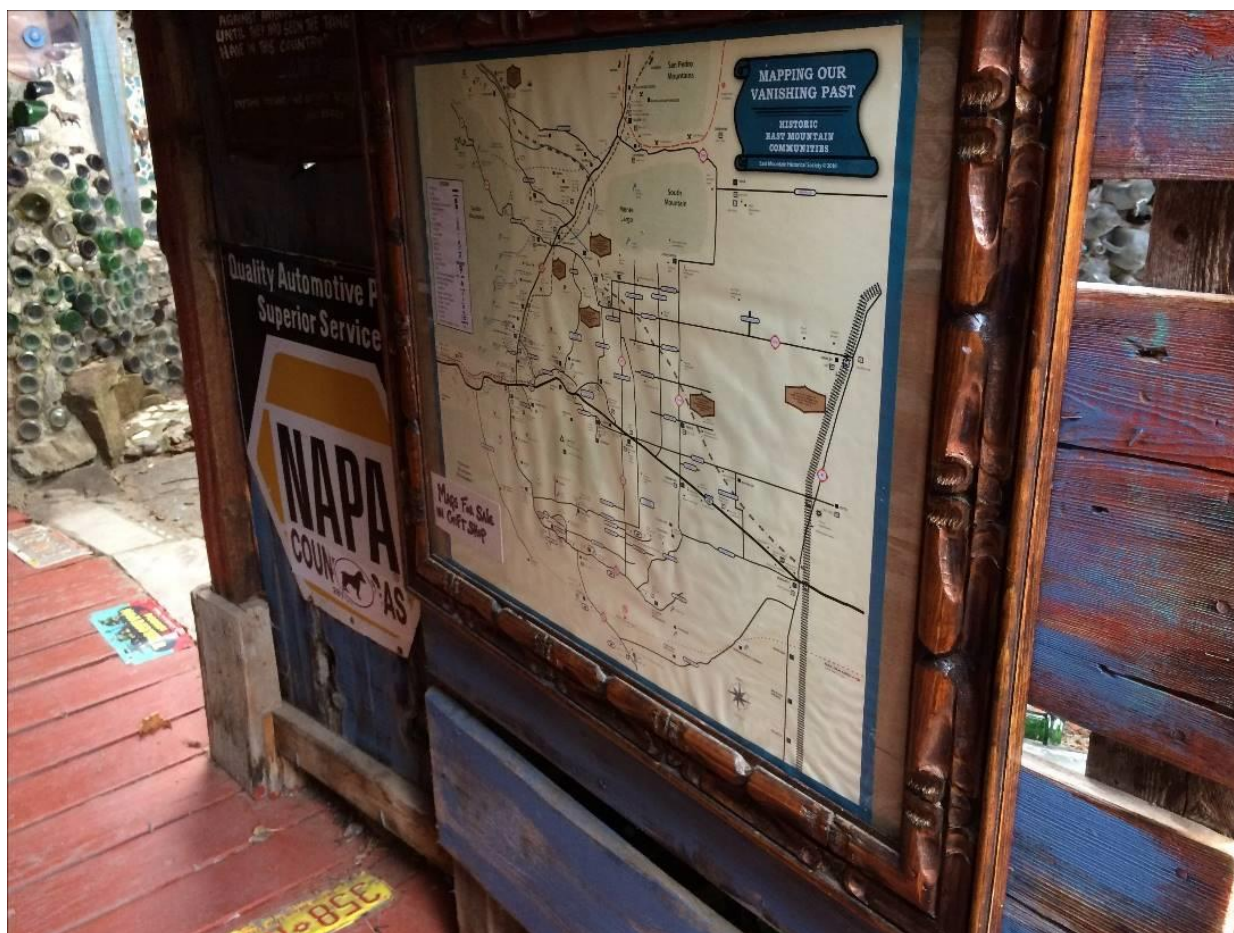

A framed *Mapping Our Vanishing Past* is the last thing visitors see before exiting through the gift shop at world-famous **Tinkertown**, where they can then buy our map, featuring more than 200 local natural and man-made landmarks that are vanishing or no longer exist.

In addition to Tinkertown (located on the road to Sandia Crest), EMHS' popular map is also available in Cedar Crest at the **Triangle Grocery** and at **Hey Mavis!** and in Tijeras at **Roots Café**. Hey Mavis has the map in poster form as well as the folded version.

Triangle and Hey Mavis also carry our historical photo calendar, *2019 East Mountains: Then and Now*, as do the **Moriarty Historical Museum**; Roots Café and **Brandy's Hair Design** in Tijeras; and **The Independent** newspaper in Edgewood (in the old library building). Calendars and maps also will be available at the EMHS table at the San Antonio fiesta June 15.

The Moriarty museum also carries six-card gift packs of our reproductions of vintage Route 66 postcards, available individually at the Triangle and at **Owl Café** on Eubank in Albuquerque.

## **Land Grant Genízaro Nation Conference Rescheduled**

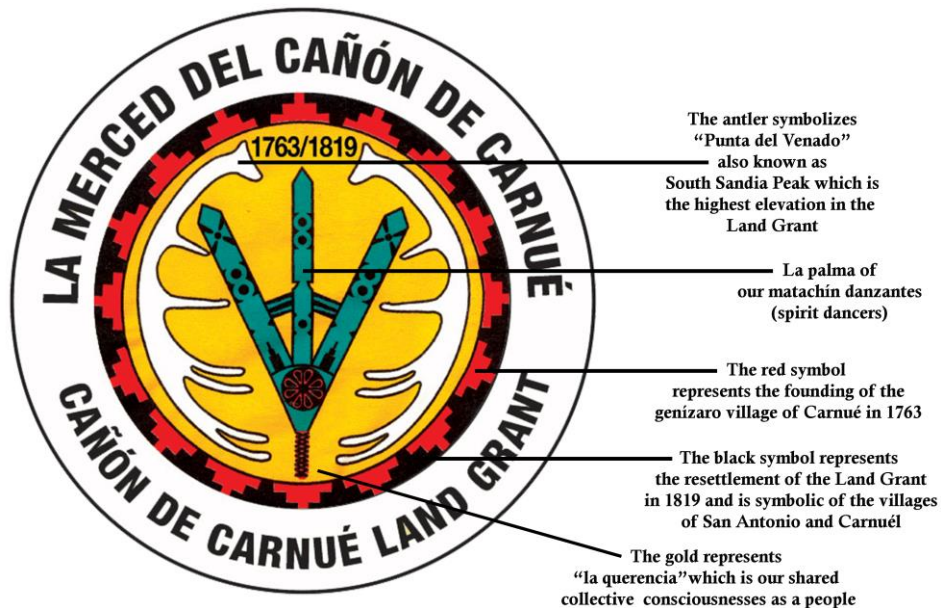
Due to conflicts in May, the Cañón de Carnué Land Grant has moved its "*Nación Genízara: Gathering and Sharing*" Conference to Saturday, Aug. 24.

All day, noted scholars and authors will share knowledge and stories related to *genízaro* culture, history, slavery, early settlements, genealogy, music and art. Among the panelists, organizer Moises Gonzales said, are three who spoke at the May 18 *Genízaro* Identity forum at Gutierrez-Hubbell House: law professor Bill Piatt, "*Genízaro* Identity/Dignity in the Law"; Yavapai/Apache member Maurice Crandall, on indigenous captivity; and Los Alamos National Laboratory research technologist Miguel Torrez, Native American genetic history.

Other participants include, so far, local author Judy Alderete Garcia; Susan M. Gandert, who discovered Indian slavery in her own family; and Dr. Irene Blea, author of Chicano social science textbooks; all from New Mexico, plus Virginia Sanchez, who has written extensively about captives in Southern Colorado and the Utes.

The conference, which also celebrates the land grant's 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary, starts with a reception at 6 p.m. Aug. 23 at the campground/picnic area south of the land grant hall. A dance will be held Saturday evening. EMHS will be among those hosting a sales booth. Registrants have the option to camp on-site.
